Carl taught his class while Chantal relaxed, read, visited with friends, worked part-time in the Alumni Office and searched for a place for us to live. On July 29, about 30 of our friends helped us to load the moving truck (it only took 3 hours!), and on July 30 we began our journey westward, with much-appreciated help from Carl's dad and stepmom. We moved into our new apartment on August 1 and Chantal started her new job on August 6.

And here we are, back in California. Carl is enjoying teaching sections of Religion & Culture and New Testament survey, and is at the beginning stage of writing his dissertation. Chantal is settling into her new job—supporting about 10 staff members and supervising student assistants—and feels that she's using her gifts and strengths. We're blessed to both be working on campus; we carpool together as much as possible and have lunch together at least once a week. We're living in a 2-bedroom, 2-bath condo-esque apartment, which is about a 30-minute drive from campus. The best room in our apartment is our guest bath, which is decorated with Texas/Waco/Baylor memorabilia (its clock is even kept on Texas time!). It's truly a masterpiece. We attend Malibu Church of Christ, and the college Care Group on Wednesday nights.

We both miss the Waco community and Texas in general—we were really good honorary Texans for the past 5 years—but Chantal misses it more. Although she continues to adjust to the transition, she is trying to bloom where she's been planted. She is also finding consolation in the fact that our current long-term plan is to retire to Waco!

While the move to California consumed most of our attention this year, we also had time for some other events and activities: in January, we rejoiced in the births of Traci "Camille" Gibson (born to our dear Waco friends Brent & Katherine) and Tessa Lynn Irish Minewiser (born to our dear Michigan friends Jim & Jenni), as well as the engagement of Carl's stepbrother Eric; Carl taught a class on Reformation and Restoration history at church on Wednesday nights during the spring; we both participated in the first Central Texas Komen Race for the Cure® (held in Waco in April) and the Los Angeles County Race for the Cure® (held at the Rose Bowl in November); Chantal's Mama visited us in Waco for Easter weekend; Chantal attended Malibu Church of Christ's Women's Retreat in October; we

both attended Carl's annual professional conference in Denver in November; and we've spent lots of time (Memorial Day weekend, Labor Day weekend, Thanksgiving, Christmas, birthdays, and various dinner get-togethers) with our southern California families. In addition, we celebrated our 9th wedding anniversary on December 12 (and after everything that's happened this year, we still like each other!).
